## From the Principal cont...

### COVID-19 Update

For your information, the College has undertaken considerable preparation for managing the potential impact of COVID-19 in 2022. As a school leader it is important to ready each key area of the College to ensure academic, wellbeing and business continuity.

In recent weeks we have been ensuring that staff are equipped with the right tools and systems to transition to remote learning at any time should there be a need. It is also important for us to anticipate what it might mean for Tranby to 'live with COVID-19' in the future. Consideration has been given to room allocations, ventilation, sanitisation and the establishment of protocols for learning, including social distancing and studying remotely.

The most important thing for families to do is to ensure your son or daughter has a working laptop, is familiar with our use of SEQTA and Microsoft Teams or Seesaw.

Should there be any significant developments during the year you will be contacted directly via SEQTA by the College with guidance about how to negotiate changing circumstances.

During the year we will also keep you up to date with news or notifications about COVID-19 on our website. Please read below to understand how the state directives regarding vaccination mandates regarding schools may affect you.

#### **Vaccination Mandates**

As you will be aware, there are health directives issued by the Government regarding mandatory vaccinations for education workers. This means that no staff member can attend the College if they are not fully vaccinated by the 31st January 2022. Our compliance with this directive is already well advanced and we do not anticipate major impact on our staffing profile.

Please note that this directive also applies to regular volunteers at schools. These are defined as volunteers who attend the College at least once a week. If this applies to you, please forward evidence of your vaccination status to <u>staffcompliance@tranby.wa.edu.au.</u>

# COVID-19 Update 96 11 November 2021

This document has been prepared for use by WA Public Schools and is provided to Independent Schools for their information and use in decision-making processes.

This document is uncontrolled and some information relating specifically to Department of Education operational processes has been removed prior to distribution.

Not all COVID-19 information is covered in these questions and answers.

#### For information

Medical exemptions for COVID-19 vaccination The following information is taken from <u>healthy.wa.gov.au</u>.

Exemptions on medical grounds must be obtained from the Australian Immunisation Register using an IM011 form. This must be completed by a GP or specialist medical practitioner and submitted to the Australian Immunisation Register for assessment. Where an exemption is obtained, this must be provided to line managers as proof of exemption.

A person may apply for a temporary exemption from the Chief Health Officer. Applications and supporting documentation must be submitted to <u>COVIDVaccinationExemption@health.wa.gov.au</u>

A temporary exemption will only last for a limited time and may be subject to terms and conditions.

The process to obtain a medical exemption can take some time. A staff member may wish to apply for a temporary exemption from the Chief Health Officer until the medical exemption application is finalised.

Staff do not need to apply for a temporary exemption if:

- they have a medical exemption,
- they are performing a specific duty which is exempt under the Directions, or
- they are listed in the Directions as an exempt person.

#### **Communications about vaccines**

Principals and schools may have received communications from staff, parents, community members or third party providers regarding COVID-19 vaccinations for students and/or staff. These may include template letters (including cease and desist communications) and requests for risk assessments.

Staff raising concerns should ensure that they continue to act in line with the School's Code of Conduct and other relevant policies.

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Principals should respond to any concerns or complaints using their usual processes. Further support for principals can be accessed through the AISWA COVID-19 Support Team. Should you receive any written communication which you find concerning, please forward a copy of the communication to the AISWA COVID-19 Support Team.

If you have unwelcome community members attend the school to express concerns regarding COVID-19 or the vaccinations, principals should follow the processes outlined in the appropriate school policy.

#### The Resilience Project is coming to Tranby!

Throughout the year we have sought the opinions of staff, parents and students as to the future direction of the College. One of the strongest themes that emerged from staff, students and parents was for the implementation of a social and emotional learning program that fostered resilience.

A lot of research has been conducted by the College and the Wellbeing working party to ensure that we choose a sustainable, approachable, and interesting social and emotional wellbeing program that is evidence informed.

After very careful deliberation, we are excited to announce that Tranby College will be implementing 'The Resilience Project' next year. This program centres around three key pillars of Gratitude, Empathy and Mindfulness supported by the foundational skills of Emotional Literacy.

The Resilience Project has been evaluated by the University of Melbourne, with findings suggesting that students who partake in the program demonstrate improved confidence, self-esteem, wellbeing, and ability to express their emotions. Additionally, students demonstrated better knowledge and awareness of their emptions, improved relationships in both the home and school environment and are more supportive in classroom environments.

This is an exciting addition to the social and emotional learning at Tranby. More information, including how parents can be involved, will be published in the new year. ## From the Dean of Senior School

Now that our examinations have been written, final tasks completed, and reports issued, we will inevitably turn our minds to learning in 2022. I recommend that students and families take some time to talk about setting some good study habits and practices over the holidays. By being well prepared to start the new academic year from the beginning, students can maximise their learning both at school and at home.

The top five tips about making the most of your time at school and working efficiently at home are:

**1. INDEPENDENT LEARNING:** There are two types of work in Senior School. The compulsory work that your teacher tells you to do and independent learning that you are expected to do when you have no homework. You can print a handout that will give you examples of the types of things you are supposed to be doing for school when you have no homework.

2. WORK SMART: If you want to have a life and get your home learning done (for most students, this will be 1-2 hours per night), you need to work smart. Keep your personal life and schoolwork separate. Do not work in front of the TV. Switch off your phone and take a break from social media. Work in half-hour blocks and focus only on your schoolwork during that half-hour block. If you are super busy with lots of activities, then a great idea is to draw up a timetable for the week and allocate time for schoolwork over the week.

**3. BE ORGANISED AND PLAN:** Being organised makes your life easier! So have an organised space to work in, record homework in your diary, keep track of completed work and reschedule work not completed. Then, when you are told about a test or an assignment, plan the work out to be done over the available time. Make the most of your time in class; being organised and focused in the classroom means you will find it easier to complete your work at school, leaving you to work on big things like assessments at home.

**4. ASK FOR HELP EARLY:** If you do not understand something, ask for help. The sooner, the better. If there isn't time in class, see your teacher before or after class or during the break times. No one expects you to do things on your own. One of the most critical contributors to success is asking for help often and early, and do not forget family and friends, they might know more than you think!

5. LEARN HOW TO STUDY PROPERLY: If you still think that to study for a test, is to just read your book over and over, time to learn how smart people study! Smart does not necessarily mean intelligent – it means doing things so that you are successful. The main things to remember about studying for a test are: Make study notes or summaries first (write down in point form what you need to learn), learn these notes not just by reading but by testing yourself on them and do as many different questions as you can.
